

Someone suggested that Jesuit coach Gary Pasqua could use the Punch Bowl angle to inspire his Rangers. Pasqua just smiled in that knowing way of his and said, "We won't need any extra inspiration this week. This • is it and we all know it."

What they realize is that the Rangers and Friars tan-gle Friday night at Lynch's Roffino Stadium with their entire season's success rid-ing on the outcome. But as added sidelight, an added sidelight, the game's been designated the Punch Bowl in a special promotion.

What's really special, though, is that Friday night's winner earns the TCIL III-AAA crown and moves into the TCIL's semifinal playoff round.

"I'M OPTIMISTIC," said Pasqua, "but I am always optimistic. If we play our best game and should lose, we won't have any excuses.

Pasqua has plenty of respect for the Friars, yet doesn't seem awed or worried about them — even though he saw Lynch de-stroy Dunne, 62-12, last stroy

"Lynch has a well-coached team with real good balance. It is pretty sound. I didn't see anything to surprise me. Lynch looks a lot like Bob's other teams at Bishop Dunne."

Pasqua was referring to Lynch coach Bob DeCrosta, who spent four years trying to defeat Jesuit when he was head coach at Dunne. He never succeeded.

DeCROSTA feels a lot bet-ter about his chances this year. "We have the capability to beat Jesuit," he said. "I don't believe I have ever Jesuit game before."

DeCrosta sure isn't over confident. "Jesuit is still the

team to beat as far as I'm concerned," he said. "They've always had terrific personnel with good size and speed. This year is no excep-tion." McIngvale, the defensive player of the year. Friars were chosen for two offensive berths on the 22-player

McIngvale shared top honors with his coach, Bob De-Crosta. DeCrosta is coach of the year for guiding Lynch to an excellent season and into the climactic match with Jesuit for the district crown.

Lynch was only 3-7 in 1967 before DeCrosta took over. He has lifted the Friars into football prominence as well as title contention. The Friars carry an impressive 8-1 record into their meeting with Jesuit, losing only to Class AAAA Temple this season.

8-AAA Fills All-Star Cup

District champion Lancaster and runner-up Ennis paced The Times Herald selections in District 8-AAA's North Zone.

Lancaster filled six gaps on the mythical 22-man squad. Ennis, which overpowered nine straight opponents before falling to Lancaster, got the nod at no less than nine positions.

The North zone dream team boasts a backfield most any college coach would give his eyeteeth to possess.

HEADING THE list offensively is Skipper DeBorde, Lancaster's multitalented running back who runs, throws, catches and punts. He has ground out more than 1,700 yards rushing this season, carrying the ball an average of more than 30 times a game. Just for kicks he averaged 40.5 yards per punt. It was all enough for him to earn selection as the zone's offensive player of the year.

Also in that backfield is Harry Strunc, the Ennis quanterback who led the Lions through a 9-1 season. The Lions averaged 45 points per game.

Strunc's teammate, Gary Campbell, a bruising but agile 212-pounder made the team, along with elusive Gerald Ray of Athens.

BUSTER CALLAWAY, Ennis' 235-pound senior tackle, was selected as the league's defensive player of the year in the zone. He edged out Jon Milstead of Athens for the honor.

Coach Charlie Lyles, whose Lancaster team upset heavily favored Ennis in the season finale to win the zone title, was selected as the coach of the year.

Over in District 6-AAA, Plano and Bonham dominated the selections. Plano placed players in six positions, Bonham in five.

The quarterback slot goes to Alex Williams of Plano, the pint-sized scrapper who a year ago led his team to the Class AA championship. This season he has sparked the Wildcats to the district title.

Lonnie Bennett, the fleet 175pound Bonham running back was selected as offensive player of the year. And he is only a junior.

Massive Steve George (235), who goes both ways for Plano at end, got the nod as defensive player of the year.

Coach John Clark of Plano, who molded a winning team after moving up to Class AAA and being hit hard by graduation at the same time, is the 6-AAA coach of the year.


