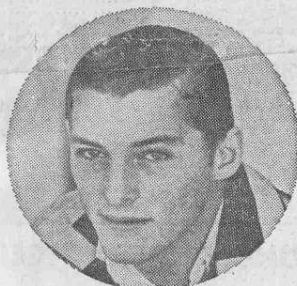

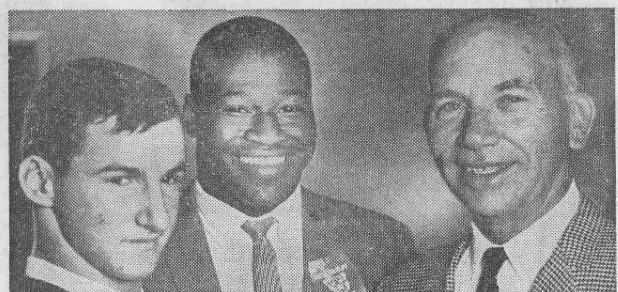

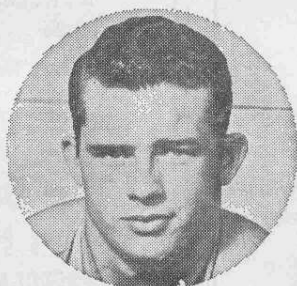
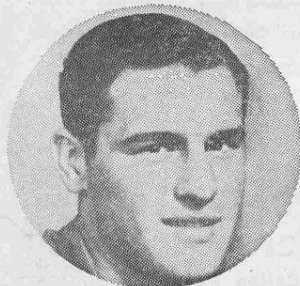

Garland's Schmidt Leads the Owls

Rick Schmidt isn't of the mold of the standard linebacker. He's not 6-1 and doesn't weigh 200 pounds.

But what Schmidt lacks in size, he makes up for in speed and aggressiveness. Yes, sir! Schmidt is about as tough as they come.

"He leads our defense," said coach Russell Coffee. "Defense has carried us all year and Schmidt has been right in there. He's small, but he's tough. You can quote me on that."

SCHMIDT, a 5-10, 175-pounder, has been cited as the defensive player of the year on The 1968 Times Herald's All-District 7-AAAA team. He's joined by his coach who was named the coach of the year for leading the Owls to the loop title and an 8-2 record in his first year.

In addition to Schmidt, there are eight other Owls on this year's team. South Garland landed five players while Denton and Highland Park each placed three players. Mesquite has two representatives while R. L. Turner is represented by linebacker Tommy Hames.

Offensively, the Owls landed end Leo Johnson, guard David Culwell, quarterback Tommy Lasater and running back Rick Pevehouse. In addition to Schmidt, Garland defense-men are end Ronnie Halpin, tackle Rick Kostue, nose guard Ted Day and halfback David Mitchell.

IT WAS difficult to limit the offensive team to four backs. Thus five were named and Denton's quarterback Don Woods was moved to a running back position. Other backs selected were Highland Park's Mark Aldredge, who gained over 1,300 yards; and South Garland's Gaines Baty.

Coffee said his being named coach of the year was a tribute to his kids.

Friars, Rangers Lead Way

All-Private

Jesuit and Bishop Lynch, the two teams fighting for the TCIL III-AAA championship Friday night, have each placed six players on the Times Herald's 1968 All-Private school football team.

Three Jesuit players were named to the offensive unit and three to the defensive group — showing the Rangers' overall balance.

Lynch had four defensive selections, including Jim

McIngvale, the defensive player of the year. Friars were chosen for two offensive berths on the 22-player squad.

McIngvale shared top honors with his coach, Bob DeCrosta. DeCrosta is coach of the year, for guiding Lynch to an excellent season and into the climactic match with Jesuit for the district crown.

Lynch was only 3-7 in 1967 before DeCrosta took over. He has lifted the Friars into football prominence as well as title contention. The Friars carry an impressive 8-1 record into their meeting with Jesuit, losing only to Class AAAA Temple this season.

Game of Week

Lynch, Jesuit Get After It

There's no need for any extra incentives this week when Jesuit and Bishop Lynch battle for the first time with a football championship awaiting the winner.

Someone suggested that Jesuit coach Gary Pasqua could use the Punch Bowl angle to inspire his Rangers. Pasqua just smiled in that knowing way of his and said, "We won't need any extra inspiration this week. This is it and we all know it."

What they realize is that the Rangers and Friars tangle Friday night at Lynch's Roffino Stadium with their entire season's success riding on the outcome. But as an added sidelight, the game's been designated the Punch Bowl in a special promotion.

What's really special, though, is that Friday night's winner earns the TCIL III-AAA crown and moves into the TCIL's semifinal playoff round.

"I'M OPTIMISTIC," said Pasqua, "but I am always optimistic. If we play our best game and should lose, we won't have any excuses.

We think it will take our best effort to win."

Pasqua has plenty of respect for the Friars, yet doesn't seem awed or worried about them — even though he saw Lynch destroy Dunne, 62-12, last week.

"Lynch has a well-coached team with real good balance. It is pretty sound. I didn't see anything to surprise me. Lynch looks a lot like Bob's other teams at Bishop Dunne."

Pasqua was referring to Lynch coach Bob DeCrosta, who spent four years trying to defeat Jesuit when he was head coach at Dunne. He never succeeded.

DeCROSTA feels a lot better about his chances this year. "We have the capability to beat Jesuit," he said. "I don't believe I have ever felt this good going into a Jesuit game before."

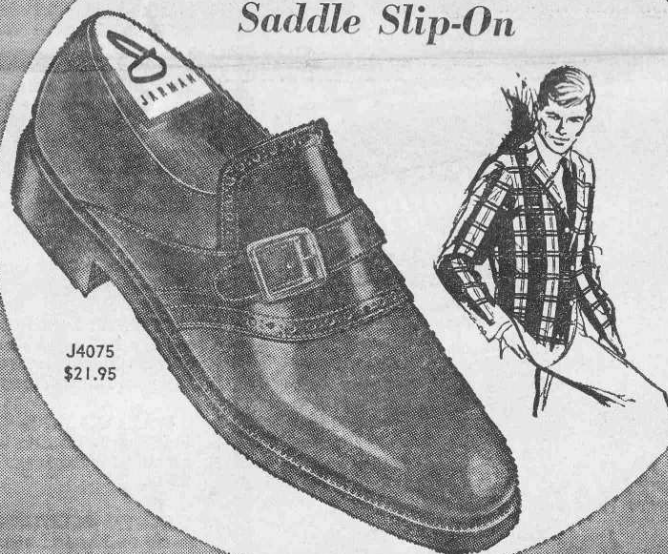
DeCrosta sure isn't overconfident. "Jesuit is still the team to beat as far as I'm concerned," he said. "They've always had terrific personnel with good size and speed. This year is no exception."

You only have to count the All-District selections to determine which teams claimed the crowns for District 11-AA and 12-AA.

In 12-AA, Forney's champion Jackrabbits filled eight positions while Kirkpatrick claimed nine spots on the 11-AA dream team.

The two Forney performers probably most responsible for the Jackrabbits' success made the offensive backfield in 12-AA. That would be quarterback Earl O'Daniel, McQuiston is a threat through the air or on the ground. And he's only a junior. O'Daniel is a bruising runner who has ground through opponents on offense and stopped them while on defense.

O'Daniel was named the district's defensive player of the year, as he gained selections on both the offensive and defensive All-District teams.

Offensive player-of-the-year honors in 12-AA went to colorful Curtis Jeff of Dallas J. N. Ervin, the district's leading pass receiver.

Forney coach Weldon Strain was named coach of the year after his team scrapped its way to the district title after being picked to finish fourth in pre-season forecasts.

In District 11-AA the back of the year is "Lightning" Wade Williams, the 9.3 sprinter who sparked Fort Worth Kirkpatrick to the loop title. With him in the backfield is teammate Michael Burleson at quarterback.

Rounding out that backfield is big Bill Woolard of Alvarado and a fleet 170-pound sophomore, James Starks, from Midlothian.
