

Will driver's education be a compulsory course for Irving High students next year?

A plan providing each high school free driver's education was presented to the 57th Texas Annual PTA Convention by Ben Barnes, Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives.

Barnes told the convention that such courses are the answer to the "grim problem" of death on

the highways. thing out on a state-local cooperative basis, since our local tax dollars are already spread about as thin as they can be," he said," "Twenty seven states are already providing financial aid to school districts for driver's education, and I think Texas ought to join in."

She said the course will take place during school and be a requirement because everyone needs to know how to drive. She said that chances of the plan being adopted are very good not only because the convention is for it, but the Department of Public Safety is supporting it strongly.

SEVERAL STUDENTS and teachers voiced their approval of the plan. Mr. Jon Leffingwell, Irving High government teacher, that he feels the course would cause better qualified drivers, both mentally and physically, with more experience in driving safety. He thinks that this would in turn cut down on accidents.

BECKY CAMPBELL, Irving High junior, said, "I think it is a great idea because with more training there would be fewer accidents. If it is free for each student, everyone will have a chance whereas students may not be able to afford it."

Linda Moffett and Charlotte Burch, seniors, agreed that the course will prove profitable to many students.

THIS PROPOSAL is one of the original 16 proposals introduced to the State Board of Education earlier this year. It will be placed before the 60th Texas Legislature in January.

# 'Bad Seed' Receives 2 Standing Ovations

The Thespian play "Bad Seed" ended its December 8 and 9 presentation with a standing ovation both nights.

In the two scenes when Gwen Crandall, who played Mrs. Daigle, was drunk and went to see Mrs. Penmark, her hysterics filled the audience with such empathy that her exits were greeted with great applause.

THE AUDIENCE was made to feel the anxiety of Mrs. Penmark by Vickie Jones' constant twisting of her hands. Vickie again this year had the lead and proved to the audience how versatile she is in acting. She put a great amount of feeling into the scene in which Leroy was killed making

her performance very arousing. Tina Neff, a freshman, also held one of the main parts. Tina as Rhoda displayed a surprising amount of talent and showed the audience that they most likely

will be seeing her often in the next three years. She was able to make the audience think of her as an eight year old.
A NEW ACTING discovery was

Cindi Dixon who portrayed Monica Breedlove. The perfect person for the part, one would expect she was type cast. The use of her hands while she was talking added to Monica's flighty character. Cindi added a refreshing part to the play and acted it out beautifully. She, too, will probably be seen again.

David Hill as Leroy was back again this year after having the male lead last year. His acting was not a new discovery and was not surprising, for he too is a versatile actor. His fire scene was so vivid that the wall that separated him from the audience seemed to vanish, and they could see the torture he was going through. He did an outstanding job in a difficult role and greatly added to the success of the play.

SHERRY KELSO as Miss Fern appeared to be type cast also. The role seemed to come naturally to her without having to act. She was able to portray the doubt in the teacher's mind concerning Rhoda's innocence to the audience

Rick Huebner played the part of Reginald Tasker. His characterization was not as complex as the others, but he presented it extremely well. Ron Cowart as Mr. Penmark also displayed his acting ability, although he too had a normal role. Rusty Shaw, Lindsey Horton, and Joe Shaw as the Messenger, Emory Wages, and Mr. Daigle had the minor roles.



# Modern Fad Reverts To Ancient Customs

As man becomes more civilized he seems to revert to ancient customs or so it seems with the present fad of the pierced

If present trends continue with the earring getting longer and larger every day, soon girls may be seen with actual "ear plugs" supporting bobs up to 41/2 inches in diameter weighing up to 2 lbs. and 14 ozs. Such was the case of the Berwan people of Borneo who had their earlobes stretched as to pierce them with holes, up to one inch in diameter, in which a plug was placed to support the enormous weight dangling at the end of the ear-

The history of the pierced ear is a long one dating back to prehistoric man who tried to dress up himself with crude stone ornaments. Until the time of the Etruscans, who made beautiful gold hoops, a large varation of materials were used to make their rings.

The trend of using gold for earrings was later picked up by Egyptian artisans who made lovely flowers, fruits, vases, pea-cocks, and even Medusa heads. Archaelogical excavation has found long series of pendant chains hanging from disks in both Egypt and Assyria.

Symbols and forms which were considered sacred were made into ear ornaments. Mycenaeans wore pendant bull's heads or forms based on the bull's head. Greeks of upper society wore rings with carved statues of famous gods of godesse

Greeks gave classification to their earrings ranging from the simple, "enotia" to the stalagma", forms of water droplets; to the finest in shapes of sta-tues and pictures, the "crotolia." Even statues from these people have been seen with the perforated lobe, for the earrings to be placed .

Men began to wear earrings nearly exclusively in the Orient by displaying fine jewels. In 208 AD Emperor Alexander Severus of Rome had men executed if they wore earrings, because he believed he should be the only one to wear them.

Barbaric Northmen wore the earring due to an old superstition. They believed that "earrings prevent evil and malicious suggestions from entering the

By the 17th century the wear-ing of earrings took to decline and usually were not worn by anyone but pirates, gypsies, sail-ors, and Latins. Finally at the end of the 19th century earrings came back into style, but were altered with a clip instead of a hoop through the ear. Within the past 2 years the pierced look has again come back with a great flourish and is worn by a great precentage of the womenfolk.


Beat music is giving way to the occasional sound of Christmas songs as disc jockeys acknowledge the approaching Yuletide.


