

SAT Entrance ACT or Which Exam For

All universities, colleges, and junior colleges require an entrance exam. Your choice of a school is the determining factor as to which test you would take.

Junior coleges in Texas accept the American College Test (ACT). Included in these junior colleges are Kilgore Junior College, Tyler Junior College, El Centro, and Tarrant Junior College. The four year colleges and universities that accept the ACT are Midwestern, Sam Houston in Huntsville, Baylor University, Fort Worth Christian College, Texas Women's Univer-sity, Steven F. Austin, Abilene Christian College, East Texas State University, Dallas Baptist College and all other four year Baptist affiliated colleges.

The ACT can be taken on Dec-ember 14, February 8, April 26, or July 19. It can be taken at Dallas Baptist College, El Centro, Thomas Jefferson High School, Adamson High School, Brian Adams High School on any of these dates. The University of Dallas gives the ACT on all dates except April 26.

Most of the four year colleges and Universities require the Scho-lastic Apitude Test (SAT). The

University of Houston, the University of Texas at Arlington and Austin, North Texas State University, A & M, Texas Christian University, Southern Methodist University, Texas Tech, and Southwestern University at Georgetown all require the SAT. The University of Dallas accepts

either the ACT or SAT.
The SAT can be taken at Southern Methodist University on Akard, Hockaday, Thomas Jefferson High School, Saint Marks, Kimble High School, Samuel High School, or Woodrow Wilson High School on woodrow witson high school on December 7, January 11, March 1, May 3, and July 12. The Univer-sity of Dallas gives the SAT on December 7, January 11, or March

Students who wish to sign up for the ACT or the SAT may sign up in Mrs. Green's office. The fee for the SAT is \$5.50 and the ACT

is \$6.00. When a student signs up for the ACT or the SAT, he receives a receipt showing that he did sign up, but the ordering of material for the test is up to the individual student.



OLDER POPULATION

Mr. Edward said that 43 per cent of the population of France is over forty years old, because France has the lowest birth rate other country. He said in 1936-1946, France's population declined by two million people, al-though France only lost about a half a million people in the war.

French universities are "impossible to get in, impossible to pass, and even if you do, you don't know what you want to do," said Mr. Edward. There are only 21 universities in France. He said Texas, alone, has 40 per cent more college students than France. Only 50 per cent of the students graduate from college. He said the students who go to college have to pass an exam that consists of five essay questions on philosophy, economics, and English. The essays together are supposed to total 10,-000 to 15,000 words. The exams are so hard because French universities are state supported and the tuition is free.

Most young people go no higher than high school. Mr. Edward said. After high school they go to a trade

He said a policeman came up behind him and knocked him down. 

Irving Flushes Gopher Bowl With Lowry-Mays Tidal Wave

The district 6-AAAA leaders, the Irving Tigers, soundly bruised Grand Prairie, 34-22, in last Friday's battle.

The contest between Mike Presley's passing ability and the Lowry-Mays combination was on. In the first quarter each side suc-

ceeded in drawing blood.
Tiger Coach Ken Dabbs said that the opponent's strength lay in their ability to throw the ball and the Gopher's first score proved him right. They took the opening kickoff and trounced over the Ti-gers for 66 yards in 14 plays and made it 7-0. Irving then scored with Lowry's rolling left from 10 yards out. It was tied, 7-7.

Later a penalty moved the ball up to the Grand Prairie 20, where Lowry rolled left again to go into the end zone unmolested. Eight plays later on the same play, Lowry

The Gophers moved to the Tiger 25 after a short kickoff and found themselves with a fourth and seven situation. Here Presley unleashed his golden arm in a touchdown toss to Mark Pringle.

On the fourth Tiger TD march starting on their own 11, the Tigers rushed up to the Gopher 39 where Lowry faked to Mays and let the bomb fly to Dempsey Clinton all alone at the 5. His TD moved the score up to 28-14.
